CLUOV Recognized At Conference

Community Living Upper Ottawa Valley (CLUOV) has earned two provincial awards in recognition of our work in spreading the inclusion message.

The first is the James Montgomerie Community Award, given to an organization that demonstrates leadership and innovation in furthering the Community Living movement. The commitment to personal outcome measures and the residential focus to develop more inclusive living options was what put CLUOV over the top for the award.

The second award that CLUOV received was the Social Media Award. This award recognizes the effort to use social media to promote inclusion and the Community Living movement. The 31 Days of Inclusion campaign, which ran during Community Living Month in May, was highlighted with the award win. The

posts featured local people, organizations and businesses who were part of building an inclusive community, and posts were commented on and shared throughout the month.

The awards were created by Community Living Ontario to recognize the work of their agencies. The official presentation was made in Niagara Falls on September 13. CLUOV earned the awards out of initiatives put forward by more than 100 Community Living agencies in Ontario. CLUOV's Larry Markus earned the James Montgomerie award for individual achievement in 2013 for advocacy as a blood donor.

My story with Community Living began when my daughter, Lauren, was born in 1991 with an intellectual disability that ultimately left her in a medically fragile state. Lauren passed away in 2003. My sister's son, Brett, was born in 1994 with Down Syndrome. Today he is a happy, healthy and thriving young man who brings great delight to all who have had the fortune to be a part of his life.

Our family has been greatly touched by the work of Community Living and my father served on the board for many years before I made the decision to join in 2010. As a board member, I have seen much change within the sector, and am proud of the efforts made by the organization and especially the dedicated staff. Although I am leaving the board to pursue other civic commitments, I will always be a strong advocate and supporter of the most important and valuable work of Community Living as they support individuals to achieve absolute inclusion within our community.

Could You Be A LifeSharer?

One of the programs Community Living has always been involved with is the family home program. This year, the program was changed to LifeShare, in order to appeal to more families who could invite an individual with an intellectual disability to live in their home.

On average, there are two to three families per year that are inquiring about host family opportunities through Community Living. Typically, there is one family per year that signs up to become a host family. LifeShare offers a nurturing and safe environment for adults with intellectual disabilities. Being a home provider means so much more than

providing a room in your home; you're giving someone a place they can call home where they are supported, valued, accepted and can have a real sense of independence and belonging. LifeShare is available on a permanent basis, as well as part of a respite program.

The Community Living staff noted that the Mulvhill staff are always patient and helpful when they are called with questions or concerns about medication. They are very accommodating with any changes or medication errors, and have often been able to suggest additional medications to alleviate issues that seemed impossible to control. Their advice is well-heeded and their delivery of safe med storage and save med use has been very helpful for individuals living independently.

What Do We Do With Golf Tournament Funds?



Addressing Inclusive Living

A development project in southern Ontario brought forward a discussion on segregated living. disabilities, those who are aging, and others. Segregated living deeply contributes to marginalization, isolation and stigmatization of people with disabilities. This is why our agency is working with community partners to create more inclusive residential environments. These opportunities allow for affordable housing solutions at any stage in life.

Beyond Outcomes Conference

Kristy Phinney, a worker with Community Living, attended Beyond Quality Outcomes conference this year. The conference focuses on measuring the quality of services that organizations provide.

Eight dynamic speakers discussed different strategies to ensure organizations could reach their potential in offering the best quality of life for people with intellectual disabilities. They also offered solutions on measuring success.

Among the key take-aways was that often a shift from traditional ideas and perspectives can enhance collaboration and lead to creative possibilities. Some suggestions included having paid neighbours, and for individuals to live near staffing support.

Mental health and addiction issues were discussed, as was the need for all parties to be accountable and knowledgeable of their respective roles. The Ministry of Community and Social Services also spoke about a framework they are producing to measure the work of an agency.

A central theme was that while data is important, it is not the only factor in outcomes. Measuring strategies can happen with different methods for positive results.

Algonquin College Job Fair

Community Living is always looking for the best and the brightest to join the team, so when the opportunity came to be part of Algonquin College's job fair, we were there!

Melissa Hoffman (in photo below) and Bianca Vanasse, an Algonquin College Social Services Worker (SSW) student, attended the Algonquin College job fair earlier this year. They accepted resumes and handed out information to interested students. The job fair worked both ways as Melissa met with other employers from Pembroke at the job fair, and was able to obtain some information on college programs. Community Living attended another job fair hosted by the college in the fall of 2017.



Residents Find New Home

Spring's heavy rains and flooding resulted in embankment erosion at the Community Living Moffat Street home in Pembroke, resulting in an emergency evacuation of our residents. The gentlemen took it all in stride with the assistance of their support team, and were relocated to hotel and cottage living. After



actively engaging in an exhaustive search of the local rental market, the gentlemen and their support staff found a new house to call home and forged a new partnership with the landlord. In July, they hosted a housewarming party to show off their home and to thank those who helped during their unexpected adventure.



A Foundation For The Future

In April, Community Living received a grant of \$121,217 to enhance community engagement and develop intentional neighbourhoods. Plans are underway to sell two properties, and redistribute the funds to new accommodations. We have also included a funding request to assist with a rent supplement. Partnering

with the Petawawa Senior Housing Corporation will allow seniors with disabilities to secure opportunities to live amongst other seniors. While receiving the support they need to be as independent as possible, all will benefit from relationships with neighbours. Occupancy transition is anticipated for early 2018.

I don't remember the exact moment my life changed, but it did while working for Community Living.

I started working here 21 years ago this October at the age of 23. I was new to the area, starting a new life and new job. Nobody told me this would also be the most rewarding and fulfilling job I would ever hold, even on some days when it was emotionally the worst.

There have been days where I find myself more comfortable surrounded by people I support with intellectual disabilities, than the general population. I have days I feel more at home while at work than I do in my own home.

It's tough when people in the community still think it is ok to use the "r" word, or that people stare - adults stare. I only wish they could see that the people I help support are

human beings, real people too, and I work to show how they are active, productive members of the community just like everyone else.

Over the years I have seen change. Our community is more accepting, and we have achieved inclusion in so many ways. I have been introduced to so many people and made so many connections from them here in Ottawa Valley and it has assisted me to feel included and part of this community. 21 years later, this community has become my home and this job, my profession.

I enjoy sharing experiences I have been a part of over the years. The goals that have been reached and so many accomplishments. I am proud to say I have been a part of it.

When I am asked to explain why I work for Community Living, I sum it up by saying this: "At the end of the day you learn quickly how some things can't be explained by words, and can only be seen and/or felt."
